The District is in the process of permitting a permanent, seasonal household hazardous waste facility. It will be open mid- to late- May through September, by appointment only. When we get all of the permits and containers in place, we will advertise the days and hours that the facility is open. There will be a nominal charge—\$10 for up to 10 gallons/car.

**Used motor oil** is accepted at Advance Auto Parts, Chester (546-2558); Matulonis Body Shop, Springfield (885-5000); & Spurr's Repair, Perkinsville (263-5459).

Call first to confirm. All of these businesses want the oil to be "**clean**" - no water, no antifreeze, no other fluids mixed with it. Both oil-based and latex paint are accepted **year-round, for free,** by Bibens Home Center and Sherwin-Williams in Springfield. The paint cans must not be rusty or leaky.



Bring the rusty, leaky cans, if there is still paint in them, to the permanent HHW facility in Springfield.

# **Recyclables and Trash**

Contract with a hauler, or take recycling, trash, and food scraps to the following facility—

To use the Transfer Station, residents must purchase an access permit sticker and punch cards to pay for trash (recycling and household food scrap drop-off are free). Annual stickers are available for purchase for \$25 at the Springfield and Chester town offices. Punch cards are also available at the town offices and at participating area merchants. Contact the town offices or visit www.springfieldvt.gov for the latest information.

All kinds of batteries are accepted and recycled **for free** at the Transfer Station: rechargeable, AA, AAA, C, D, 9v, hearing aid,

and watch batteries.



Fluorescent tubes (10/visit) and bulbs (unlimited) have mercury in them so they need to be disposed of properly. The Transfer Station accepts those **for free**.





Televisions, computer monitors, printers, hard-drives, and peripherals are recycled **for free** at the Transfer Station.

Useable, saleable **clothing** is accepted at the Second Chance Shop at the Transfer Station and at the SEVCA Good Buy Store on Main Street in Springfield. Ask at each location if they will take clean and dry linens, shoes, purses, belts, gloves, towels, sheets, and stuffed animals.

### Backyard Composters for Sale

The District offers Soil Saver composters for sale every spring for **\$65**. The 100% recycled plastic composter is 28" wide x 28" deep x 32" high and has a 10-year manufacturer's guarantee.





We also sell Sure-Close food-scrap pails for \$5 each.
