No more 4-hour collections

The District is in the process of permitting a permanent, seasonal household hazardous waste facility. It will be open mid- to late- May through September, by appointment only. When we get all of the permits and containers in place, we will advertise the days and hours that the facility is open. There will be a nominal charge—\$10 for up to 10 gallons/car.

Bring:

aerosols
antifreeze
automotive products
gasoline
hobby chemicals
household cleaners
kerosene
mercury thermometers
mercury thermostats
paint
paint cleaners
pesticides
pool chemicals

Bring in a mercury thermometer—get a free digital thermometer.

Do NOT Bring:

asbestos
ammunition
fireworks
medical waste
medicines
radioactive material

The Weathersfield Transfer Station takes:

- ◆ tires
- ◆ auto batteries
- ◆ household batteries
- ◆ computers
- ◆ fluorescent bulbs
- ◆ used motor oil

All wastes in 55-gallon drums—MUST call ahead

drop boxes are located at police departments in: Bellows Falls, Ludlow, Springfield, and Windsor—easy and safe.



Used motor oil is accepted at Advance Auto Parts (546-2558) and Matulonis Body Shop (885-5000) in Springfield.

Call first to confirm. These businesses want the oil to be “clean” - no water, no antifreeze, no other fluids mixed with it.

Both oil-based and latex **paint** are accepted **year-round, for free**, by Aubuchon Hardware in Windsor and Bibens Home Center and Sherwin-Williams in Springfield. The paint cans must not be rusty or leaky.



If they still contain paint, bring the rusty cans to the permanent HHW facility.

Recyclables and Trash

You can contract with a hauler, or take recycling, trash, and food scraps to the following facility—

Weathersfield residents who use the Transfer Station must obtain and display a current vehicle sticker, which may be obtained at the Weathersfield Town Office. Trash disposal is paid by a punch card system; recycling is free; food scraps are \$1/gallon. Punch cards may be purchased at the Sunoco Station in Ascutney, Weathersfield Town Office, and Downers Corners Store in Perkinsville. All kinds of batteries are accepted and recycled **for free** at the Transfer Station: rechargeable, AA, AAA, C, D, 9v, hearing aid, watch, and car batteries.



Fluorescent tubes and bulbs have mercury in them so they need to be disposed of properly. The Transfer Station accepts those **for free**.



Televisions, computer monitors, printers, hard-drives, and peripherals are recycled **for free** at the Transfer Station.

Useable, saleable **clothing** is accepted at the Salvation Army Store in West Lebanon, the SEVCA Good Buy stores in Springfield and Hartford, and LISTEN in White River Junction. Ask at each location if they will take clean and dry linens, shoes, purses, belts, gloves, towels, sheets, and stuffed animals.

Backyard Composters for Sale

The District is offering Soil Saver composters for sale for **\$65**. The 100% recycled plastic composter is 28" wide x 28" deep x 32" high and has a 10-year manufacturer's guarantee.



We also sell Sure-Close food-scrap pails for \$5 each.
